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Unite against coronavirus

As we continue to cope with life under lockdown in the UK, there is great concern for our sisters and brothers in countries throughout the Global South as the spread of coronavirus continues.

With fragile health systems and challenges such as overcrowded housing and poor sanitation facilities, these countries are less prepared to cope. It will be the most vulnerable who are hit the hardest.

But we are responding quickly. Our local experts are already in these communities helping those in need, preventing the spread of the virus and protecting lives.



As well as responding with practical help, our own government has a role to play. We have a new petition which urges the UK Government to ensure that the most vulnerable and marginalised people are the priority in the UK's international efforts as well as at home.

Our petition asks our Prime Minister to work with other world leaders to:

- Make sure that any **vaccine** developed with UK public money is made available to everyone regardless of income or where in the world they live.
- Provide urgent financial and technical support to help developing countries cope with this crisis.
- Cancel all **debt** payments by developing countries due in 2020 so that countries can spend money on much needed healthcare rather than debt repayments.
- Put plans in place to rebuild a fairer, more just society after the crisis so that the world's most vulnerable people can live in dignity and to restore our common home for future generations

Pope Francis urges debt cancellation for poorest countries

In his Easter Urbi et Orbi message of hope, Pope Francis called for the world to be united in the face of the coronavirus pandemic. Urging us all to reject indifference, he called for the reduction or cancellation of the debt that is "burdening the balance sheet of the poorest nations."

This is one of the things we're urging the government to do with our petition (see overleaf). The government must wield its influence and work with world leaders to cancel all debt payments by developing countries due in 2020. This money could then be used for desperately-needed improvements to health systems and infrastructure.

There has already been some progress. In April, the G20 group of the world's largest economies announced that more than 70 countries could stop making debt payments over the next eight months to the countries they owe. This would save around \$12 billion.

This is a welcome step to help countries prepare for the devastation of coronavirus. However, debts must be cancelled - not just suspended - to avoid simply postponing an economic crisis to next year.
